FROM THE PRESIDENT

Attending a holocaust program and listening to the stories of those who will soon be gone, is a way of saying kaddish for the memory of those who have no one else, for remembering so they are not forgotten.

On Thursday, May 10, 2018 at 7 PM, the Nauset Interfaith Association will again sponsor the Annual Holocaust Memorial Program, held at the Nauset Regional Middle School, Orleans. *Am HaYam Havurah*, a long-time constituent member of the Association, is represented in its yearly planning by the active involvement of Milton Teichman and Sharon Leder. This year's guest speaker will be Beatrice Muchman, author of *Never To Be Forgotten: A Young Girl's Holocaust Memoir*, and the cousin of *Am HaYam* Board member Renate Wasserman with whom she connected many years after the war in the U.S.

In addition to participating in this program, *Am HaYam* provides scholarships for local teachers to attend "The Facing History and Ourselves" Program which "provides ideas, methods, and tools that support educators worldwide who share the goal of creating a better, more informed, and more thoughtful society." Over the years, the *Havurah* has provided scholarships to educators in the following school districts: Nauset Regional, Chatham, Harwich, Dennis-Yarmouth Regional, Barnstable and Falmouth.

The Annual Holocaust Memorial Program explores sacrifice, survival, and memory, and allows us, those sitting in our comfortable seats, to be witnesses to an extreme history; to hear the stories, remember the past and confront the future. Attending such programs often makes one uncomfortable; the stories of survivors are difficult to

hear and painful to visualize; they are complex; they are unbearably sad. Many of us know the stories all too well, having seen the movies, read the books and heard the tales. Every program, every story is unique and important.

Attending a holocaust program and listening to the stories of those who will soon be gone, is a way of saying kaddish for the memory of those who have no one else, for remembering so they are not forgotten.

Prior to moving to the Cape, Bernice and I lived in Riverdale, New York in a multi-family apartment building containing 39 units of varying sizes. Among the tenants were several Holocaust survivors, survivors from ghettos, work camps and extermination/death camps. Irving D. was one of those survivors; a large bodied man with big hands and a booming voice, he had been a university student and when war began in 1939, he was commissioned an officer in the Polish Army. (A rarity as a Jew)

Captured as a POW when the Nazi's defeated the Poles, he was soon separated from the other non-Jewish prisoners and sent to a series of forced labor camps in Poland. Because of his skills in the building trades, (his father had owned a lumber mill) Irving D. was placed in charge of construction work groups, always under the control of the Nazis and their Ukrainian collaborators. The work was horrific, dangerous, the workers mistreated, beaten, starved and executed for the smallest in-

fraction and for the basic fact that they were Jews. Irving survived all that was done to him, his family destroyed, his previous life erased from existence. I know the stories of Irving D. because he told them to me many times. I was witness to his experiences.

In the evenings of the spring, summer and fall months, Irving D. would sit on a bench in the small mini-park across the street from our apartment building. Looking out of my office window, I would see him sitting alone. One evening, I made the decision to go downstairs and join him on "his" bench. Without much of a prologue, Irving began to tell his stories. They were the same night after night; it was a ritual of remembrance, of sharing of the most painful experiences one could ever endure. I listened as Irving's voice became harsher, his accented English becoming more difficult to follow. I watched as the silent tears fell from his eyes, ran down his face and stained his always-white shirt. He spoke of humiliations, of pain, of death and guilt for surviving. I listened as his witness; I memorized his stories. I honored his need to speak of the unspeakable.

One night Irving D. became embroiled in a dispute with another tenant over a minor issue; his anger out of control, out of proportion to the affront perceived, Irving D. suffered a major stroke. Three days later, Irving D. died. The horrors of the labor camps, the inability to respond to the beatings, and the daily inflictions of death and torture that came to haunt him in his dreams had finally come out in the rage that took Irving D.'s life.

It is most important that we honor those who tell their stories of survival, that we honor their resilience and bravery, that we hear of those who were righteous and that we listen and memorize the stories so that we can tell others the stories for the first time, for all the time.

This year, when the Annual Holocaust Memorial Program takes place, let us attend in large numbers so as to give honor to those who tell the tales and to bear witness to the memory of those who are gone.

Attending a holocaust program and listening to the stories of those who will soon be gone, is a way of saying kaddish for the memory of those who have no one else, for remembering so they are not forgotten.


ANNUAL HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL PROGRAM

THE COURAGE TO CARE: RESCUE DURING THE HOLOCAUST AND TODAY

Thursday, May 10, at the Nauset Regional Middle School, Orleans, at 7 PM, doors open at 6:15 PM. The guest speaker will be Beatrice Muchman, author of *Never to Be Forgotten: A Young Girl's Holocaust Memoir*. This program has relevance to the problems and needs of refugees and immigrants the world over.

After Kristallnacht (Night of Broken Glass) when Jewish businesses in Germany were ransacked, Beatrice's family fled from Berlin to Belgium. Beatrice, then age eight, was raised Catholic by two sisters to whom her parents entrusted her. Shortly afterward, Beatrice's parents perished. After the war, Beatrice's parish priest did something remarkable: He told her she needed to connect with her own faith, she was Jewish and she had to find her way back.

The program also includes musical performances by students at Nauset Regional Middle and High Schools, a special exhibit of Muslim Albanian rescuers of Jewish refugees from the Yad Vashem Museum in Israel, and tributes to local organizations involved in various kinds of rescue work on Cape Cod. The event is co-sponsored by the Nauset Interfaith Association; the Interfaith Group on the Holocaust, Genocide, and Human Rights; Monomoy Regional High School, and Nauset Regional Middle and High Schools.


ADULT EDUCATION AUTHOR PROGRAM

GETTING TO KNOW MEMBERS OF THE AM HAYAM COMMUNITY

If you look up “*Am HaYam*” in the dictionary, you would find a picture of Judy Keller. A major reason the *havurah* is such a vibrant, meaningful presence in our Jewish community, is because Judy has given it so much of her time, talents, devotion and energy for so long, and in so many ways. She was president for three years, vice president for two years and is now chair of the Ritual Committee which she has served on for ten years. In that capacity, she works with Rabbi Douglas and Cantor Anker to coordinate the High Holy Days services. Listing the details of that job would take many paragraphs. She also organizes *Shabbat* Services and the *Onegs*. She chairs the *Tzedakah* Committee and is *Am HaYam*’s liason to the Federated Church. She is an active participant in *Zamarei*, *Rosh Chodesh* Women, and Women’s Torah Study.



Special mention must be made of her unique contribution----the Purim *Shpiel*. When Judy first joined *Am HaYam*, she was dismayed to learn there was no Purim *Shpiel*. So, of course, she wrote one. For many years she has been delighting us all with her *shpiels*, writing song parodies to tell the story of Esther and getting everyone involved in the celebration of Purim.

Judy grew up and went to elementary school in the Bronx, “in the shadow of Yankee Stadium.” After her family moved to Queens, she attended Flushing High School and went on to Queens College where she majored in math education. She later attended Indiana University and received a Master’s in Environmental Education and School Camping. She was employed by the Port Washington School District, teaching math at the junior high school. She later transferred to the high school and taught there until her retirement.

Knitting and basket making are two of her favorite crafts. She makes exquisite Nantucket baskets. She also loves scuba diving and is an active member of The Reef Environmental Education Foundation and has done research around the world under their auspices. She will be working with them in Cuba next summer.

Judy’s family was not very devout, but they did celebrate the holidays. She comes from a large family and being the youngest of thirty-two first cousins was stuck with asking the Four Questions until the next generation came along. Her father impressed on her the need for each individual to embrace his/her Judaism. After his death she wanted to be more involved and became active in the Port Washington Jewish Center congregation. She celebrated her *Bat Mitzvah* in her forties in 1990.





To appease his father, Abie introduces Rosemary as “Rosie Murphyski.” Papa Levy is fooled until Rosie’s father, Patrick Murphy, arrives. A comic war erupts. Abie and Rose, having been married by a Methodist minister, are married again by a Rabbi to please Papa, and a third time by a Catholic priest to satisfy the Irish contingent. The subsequent birth of twins, a girl named Rebecca and a boy named Patrick, bring the warring factions to a peaceable cease fire.
