FROM THE PRESIDENT

What is righteousness?

As I write this article, the High Holidays are several weeks away and I know, with certainty that our High Holiday Food Drive shopping bags will be overflowing, as they are every year. In the *Haftarah* read on *Yom Kippur*, the Prophet Isaiah entreats us:

This is the fast I desire: to unlock the fetters of wickedness and untie the cords of the yoke to let the oppressed go free, to break off every yoke. It is to share your bread with hungry, and to take the wretched poor into your home.

This "Fast of Isaiah" spurs us to action and, year after year, we come to the Federated Church on *Kol Nidre* and *Yom Kippur* Day with cans, packages and boxes of assorted food for the Lower Cape Outreach Council Food Pantry. Through the generosity of our members, *Am HaYam Havurah* donations overflow, providing food to many, many hungry Cape Cod families.

Each year many of us fast on *Yom Kippur*. By mid-day our mouth is dry and we experience hunger pangs. But for the "hungry" referred to by Isaiah, the ache of hunger lasts long into the night, every night. For these reasons, and so many more, let us undertake this year to make the High Holiday Food Drive the best ever.

The High Holidays are a time to not only reflect about how to repair and strengthen our relationships with God and with our family, friends and neighbors, but also on how to make a difference and help repair

the world. Many synagogues and *havurot* use the opportunity of *Yom Kippur*, to also remember and do something about the many families in our communities who struggle with hunger every day of the year. In that regard, *Am HaYam Havurah* sponsors a High Holy Day food drive that benefits the Lower Cape Outreach Council Food Pantry.

According to *Midrash Psalms* 118:17 When you are asked in the world to come, "What was your work?" and you answer, "I fed the hungry," you will be told, "This is the gate of the Lord, enter into it, you who have fed the hungry." We can enter through the gates of righteousness if we perform acts of loving-kindness and generosity and if we practice justice as part of our work here on earth.

Jewish tradition teaches that it is our obligation to ensure that the hungry are fed. We are commanded to, "share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house" (Isaiah 58:7). Thus, when we provide food to others we complete God's work. When we feed the hungry, we act as God's surrogates to help the most helpless members of society.

In *Midrash Tannaim* on Numbers 28:2 we read, *God says to Israel, "My children, whenever you give sustenance to the poor, I impute it to you as though you gave sustenance to Me" Does God then eat and drink? No, but whenever you give food to the poor, God accounts it to you as if you gave food to God.*

Caring for the poor is a sacred act. The way we treat the needy among us is a re-

flection of our connection with God. Feeding the hungry is a way for us to show thanks for the blessings that are ours and restore balance to a troubled world.

What better time to share our good fortune and express our thankfulness for all we have than at the start of the Jewish New Year? This Fall, when we attend High Holy Day services let us undertake the *mitzvah* of feeding the hungry and fill

our Food Van with much food and love.

In the *Yom Kippur Haftarah*, Isaiah says:
*And you offer your compassion to the hungry
And satisfy the famished creature
Then shall your light shine in darkness, And
your gloom shall be like noonday.
If we do these things – we will bring light into
the world. This is the fast that God desires.*

GETTING TO KNOW MEMBERS OF THE AM HAYAM COMMUNITY

Member profile: Sherrill Stott

Sherrill's love of learning and music has drawn her deeper and deeper into her faith. She was studying at Kent State University when a musician friend asked her to hear him play the following Friday night. He was playing in the orchestra for a performance of the Bloch Sacred Service at a Cleveland synagogue. She had never heard anything like it before. She wanted to learn more about the music and went to another service, one that had a traditional Cantor. She spoke to the Cantor afterward and he recommended several readings. Sherrill had been spiritually searching for some time, and the readings sparked her interest in Judaism. She found a Rabbi to teach her and she converted to Judaism in 1968 and is now celebrating 50 years of being Jewish.

Sherrill was working as a grad assistant at Kent and had finished most of her grad work by 1970 when the shootings at Kent State took place on May 4. The campus was locked down for two weeks. She had a summer job lined up and a teaching position in place for the Fall. So, putting her degree on hold, she left to teach stringed instruments in schools in a suburb of Cleveland. When the position was cut to half time, she started doing volunteer work for the Cleveland Society for the Blind. The part-time job working with the blind inspired Sherrill to move to Boston to obtain a degree from Boston College in special education, focusing on working with the blind. In 1974 she was hired by the State of Connecticut to teach orientation and mobility for the blind. She worked there for 22 years, retiring in 2002.

Music continued to be a large part of her life in Connecticut. She played French horn in several local orchestras and bands and was called on to play for shows. She met Bruce, a trombone player and her future husband, in the orchestra pit of one of the shows. Bruce and Sherrill married in 1983 and lived in Rockville, Connecticut until retirement. They moved to Harwich in 2006.

Sherrill joined the Cape Cod Synagogue in Hyannis and became an active member of the choir and a lay service leader, but still wanted to learn more. A trip to Israel inspired her to join the AHY Women's Torah Study Group. She was not familiar the concept of a *havurah*, but gradually became more involved with the group and is now a member of the choir and leads services.

PROTOCOL FOR THE HIGH HOLY DAYS

The Ritual Committee has established the following guidelines for High Holy Day services: While the congregation is standing in prayer, no one will be permitted to enter the sanctuary or leave until the congregation is seated. Ushers will be present at the rear of the sanctuary to implement this policy. No exceptions will be made. Because we are a diverse congregation, no one is required to wear a *tallit* or *kippah* while holding the *Torah*, reciting blessings or standing on the *bimah*. *Kippot* will be available in the foyer and *tallitot* will be available on the *bimah* for those who want them.

BREAK-THE-FAST

Those wishing to break-the-fast before leaving Federated Church are invited to join together in the downstairs vestry for juice and *challah*. Since many of the participants at our services make alternative arrangements for breaking the fast, the Board of Directors voted to discontinue the larger break-the-fast gathering. We are concerned, however, that everyone who prays with us be able to break the fast with others. Four young Jews survive the Third Reich in the middle of Berlin by living so recklessly that they become “invisible.”

While Goebbels infamously declared Berlin “free of Jews” in 1943, some 1,700 managed to survive in Nazism’s capital until liberation. Claus Räfle’s gripping docudrama traces the stories of four real-life survivors who learned that sometimes the best place to hide is in plain sight. While moving between cinemas, cafés and safe houses they dodged Gestapo and a dense network of spies and informants, knowing that certain death was just one mistake away. Yet their prudence was at odds with their youthful inclination towards recklessness, sometimes prompting them to join the resistance, forge passports, or pose as Aryan war widows. Masterfully weaving the different story threads together, *The Invisibles* is a testament to the resourcefulness, willpower, and sheer chance that permit us to survive against incredible odds.

Across The Waters Thursday October 4, 2018 at 7:30 PM.

Enjoying the nightlife of 1943 Copenhagen, jazz guitarist Arne Itkin is seemingly immune to the hardships of war, as the Danish government opts for a compliant relationship with Nazi Germany. He is initially skeptical when his terrified wife Miriam hears rumors of the round-up and deportation of Danish Jews. An overnight raid however, forces the couple to flee their home with five-year-old son Jakob. Aided by a church pastor and underground resistance, they set out on a journey for the fishing village of Gilleleje, where refugees await passage to Sweden by boat. Amidst lurking danger from the Gestapo and their collaborators, the family puts its fate in the hands of strangers whose allegiance and motives are not always clear. 95 minutes Danish with English subtitles

In Search Of Israeli Cuisine Wednesday October 10, 2018 at 7:30 PM

In Search of Israeli Cuisine is a portrait of the Israeli people told through food, putting a face on the culture of Israel. Profiling chefs, home cooks, farmers, vintners, and cheese makers drawn from the more than 100 cultures that make up Israel today - Jewish, Arab, Muslim, Christian, Druze - a rich, complex and human story emerges.

Through scenes that are mostly cinema verité – interviews, farms, markets, restaurants, kitchens, landscapes, and history – audiences will discover that this hot, multi-cultural cuisine has developed only in the last 30 years. Its sophistication mirrors the current state of the Israeli people and their food: secular, outward looking, and innovative. The chef/guide of *In Search of Israeli Cuisine* is Michael Solomonov, the James Beard award winning chef/owner of Zahav and a number of other restaurants in Philadelphia. 94 minutes English

The Light Of Hope Thursday October 11, 2018 at 7:30 PM

Based on the true story of Elisabeth Eidenbenz (1913-2011) and her female co-workers who saved the lives of almost 600 infants in World War II. In the early 1940's, refugees from all over Europe seek shelter in South Western France, escaping persecution from the Nazis and from Franco's regime in Spain. Among them, there are countless women, some of them pregnant, and their little children. The camps are in horrendous shape with refugees holding out with no protection from the cold. Red Cross nurse Elisabeth Eidenbenz breathes new life into an old villa. By transforming it into a birth clinic she saves the lives of mothers and children from certain death. Despite all hardship, the villa becomes a safe haven resounding with the children's laughter. But soon threats from without and within take shape: Authorities in Nazi-occupied France demand that she hand over all Jewish refugees and their children, while Elisabeth's deputy Victoria sides with the Résistance partisans - a worthy cause but one that puts at stake the lives of everyone in the maternity. 96 minutes Catalan and German with English subtitles

Keep The Change Monday October 29, 2018 at 7:30 PM

When aspiring filmmaker David is mandated by a judge to attend a social program at the Jewish Community Center, he is sure of one thing: he doesn't belong there. But when he's assigned to visit the Brooklyn Bridge with the vivacious Sarah, sparks fly and his convictions are tested. Their budding relationship must weather Sarah's romantic past, David's judgmental mother, and their own pre-conceptions of what love is supposed to look like. 94 minutes English

The Testament Tuesday October 30, 2018 at 7:30 PM

Yoel, a senior Holocaust researcher, is in the midst of a widely covered legal battle with powerful forces in Austria, concerning a brutal massacre of Jews that took place toward the end of WWII in the village of Lensdorf. An influential family of industrialists on whose land the murder took place, is planning to build a real estate project on the very same land. Yoel suspects that their aim is to bury the affair for good, but has trouble finding the conclusive evidence that would stop the project.

While investigating the incident Yoel examines classified testimonies of Holocaust survivors, and to his shock and surprise he finds a testimony given by his mother, a testimony he didn't know existed. In her testimony she confesses to a substantial secret from her past. Yoel, who's conducting a double-investigation, personal and scientific, is trapped between walls of silence - on one side, denial of the Holocaust on the part of the villagers, and on the other, his mother's silence regarding her past. As a historian with an unshakeable commitment to the truth, he decides to continue his investigations even at the cost of ruining his personal and professional life. 93 minutes Hebrew with English subtitles
